Item No.1. Welcome address by Dr. V. E. Annamalai, Principal, Chairman, IQAC

The IQAC Chairman, Dr. V. E. Annamalai, Principal, IQAC welcomed all the members for the meeting. He shared the information about recent NIRF ranking. He said SSNCE ranking has moved upwards in all India ranking to 45 from 48 and the overall ranking to 80 from 96 last year. All the members congratulated the principal for this achievement. Thereafter the following subjects were discussed and deliberated.

Item No.2. To confirm the minutes of the last meeting of IQAC held on 22.03.2023, Coordinator IQAC

The coordinator presented a brief about the previous meeting and informed about action taken. Earlier, the minutes were sent by email to all the members of the committee.

Item No 3. To appraise the members on NBA visit on PG program accreditation

The IQAC Chairman Dr. V. E. Annamalai, Principal, appraised members on the recent NBA expert committee visit on PG program accreditation during 16 -18 June 2023. The Chairman mentioned that the expert team appreciated excellent facilities available and appreciated the UG admissions are more with high demand but the admission for PG is less. He also said that the committee appreciated the research and publications of the faculty, common facilities, Quality of faculty and technical staff and all general facilities. The chairman said that the current trend in PG admissions is the concern for all the Anna university colleges. He also pointed out that Anna University has been permitted to admit a single window counselling through common engineering admission procedure (CEAP - CEETA (PG)) a separate counselling in advance for its university Departments, Regional campuses, and constituent colleges. This makes PG student admissions in affiliated and autonomous colleges still more difficult.

Item No 4. To appraise the members on the submission of the SSR for the third cycle of NAAC accreditation

The IQAC Coordinator said that the NAAC portal is yet to open for IIQA submission. However, he said the collecting data for SSR submission for the third cycle of NAAC accreditation is in progress, with one coordinator assigned for each criterion.

Item No 5. Discussion on NEP 2020

The IQAC Coordinator gave a brief overview of NEP 2020 including key changes in the current curriculum framework and the immediate action plan for NEP 2020. The IQAC Chairman Dr. V. E. Annamalai, Principal, pointed out that SSNCE already started implementing some of the recommendations of NEP 2020 such as major and minor courses, learning in local languages, introduction of value added and skill enhancement courses, internship programs, Online courses and use of ICT tools.

Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Industry Expert member-IQAC, said that the main features of the NEP2020 are quite interesting but quite complex in implementation. He further said that it is practiced in western countries which has no affiliation system. However, usage of local language may be difficult due to non-availability textbooks in Tamil.

The Chair said the institution followed the implementation NEP 2020 as suggested by Anna University. In this regard, the chair said, Dr Durga devi, AP/ IT department was nominated as coordinator for the one-credit course on "Tamil heritage", to be taught in Tamil language in line with NEP2020 as suggested by Anna University to first year Engineering Students. Dr Durga devi, AP/ IT department explained the progress of the course during the Second semester. For this mandatory course, there were 880 students registered, out of which 312 opted for the batch taught in Tamil language. However, Students used text and reference books written in English and Tamil on Tamil Heritage. She further said Students can take their test and write in either Tamil or English language.

Item No 6. Any other points are open for discussion.

By referring to PG admissions to Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Industry Expert member-IQAC remarked that many institutions promote themselves through advertisement in mass media to attract

The meeting started at 10.30AM. The IQAC Coordinator welcomed all the members to the meeting. Thereafter the following subjects were discussed and deliberated.

Item No.1. Welcome address by the Principal, SSNCE and Chairman, IQAC

Dr. V. E. Annamalai, Chairman – IQAC welcomed all the members for the meeting and requested the members to self-introduce.

Item No.2. Approval of Minutes of the previous meeting by the Coordinator, IQAC

The coordinator presented a brief about the previous meeting and said the minutes were sent by email to all the committee members.

Item No 3. Report on the PG NBA Accreditation by the Vice- Principal, SSNCE

Dr. S. Radha, Vice principal, informed the results of the NBA visit during June 2023. She said all 5 PG programs (PED, CS, CSE, Medical Electronics, Manufacturing Engineering) have got NBA accreditation for 3 years for the period 2023-2026. Mr. N.Sivasankaran, industry expert member IQAC wanted to understand the reasons for the low percentage of admission in PG programs.

Item No 4. Report on IQAC Internal audit the Coordinator, IQAC

ISO internal audit was conducted to all academic departments covering all the 19 courses from 21.07.2023 to 29.07. 2023. The auditor's report found that the academic teaching learning process and other activities has been fully adhered to as per the process. However, a few recommendations have also been suggested for each department by the auditors to bring improvement. This will be actively considered by the department concerned. Mr. NS appreciated the efforts of the auditors and said the maximum number of non-compliances may be raised so that the quality can improve further.

Item No 5. Plan of action for the External academic audit - Coordinator, IQAC

The External Audit has been proposed to assess and ensure the quality of the academic and supporting system. Ten external audit experts will be invited, and each department will be audited by one auditor Based on the availability of external audit members it is tentatively planned during the third/Fourth week of October 2023. To a question on inviting the choice of the auditors, Dr. VEA mentioned that the expert academic members with expertise in IQAC functions from other colleges will be invited. Further, VAE insisted that the audit be completed in a single day.

Item No 6. IIQA Submission and approval regarding - Coordinator, IQAC

The IQAC Coordinator mentioned that the IIQA was submitted to NAAC last month and is waiting for the approval of NAAC for SSR submission. Dr. VEA insisted that it has to be submitted within the stipulated time and informed that NAAC gives more emphasis on NEP 2020 implementation in the accreditation process.

Item No. 7: Report on current Placement activities - Dr. N. Lakshmi Narasimhan

Dr. N. Lakshmi Narasimhan, Faculty in charge of placement gave a brief about the placement activities since the start of the semester. He gave details about different companies visited and CTC package offered. He also gave details about the number of students already placed (Super Dream, Dream, Core, Non-Core, Multiple). He was optimistic that by December 2023 almost all eligible students could get placement. Dr. NL further said that the training for placement offered during the third year was useful. Mr. NS said that now a days, the attitude of the candidate is very much essential in determining how well the candidate is suitable for the company. Dr. VEA mentioned that training for placement can start in the first year of study with an emphasis on personality development through group discussion.

Item No. 8: Industry contacts for student internships and projects - All

With reference to the industry contact, Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Industry Expert member-IQAC said that he can facilitate student and faculty internship. This will be more than an internship offered through placement office. He expressed that more internship opportunities that are currently available for MBA students and said he would further help in this regard to the students of MBA.

Item No. 9: Report on SSN Innovation Day - Dr.N. Balaji, Coordinator, SSN Incubation foundation.

Dr.N. Balaji, Coordinator, SSN incubation foundation, who could not be present during the meeting sent all the relevant information for discussion on the annual Innovation Day held on September 6th, 2023. Mr. Shankar Venugopal, Vice President - Technology and Innovation, Mahindra and Mahindra were the chief guest. A total of 70 innovation projects (92 faculty members and 150 students of SSNCE participated) were displayed and 41 companies along with 76 industry experts visited the event.

Item No. 10: Any other points are open for discussion.

Dr. SR mentioned that with the participation of the Mechanical, IT and Mathematics departments of SSNCE, a presentation was given to DST – FIST in New Delhi on 1-9-2023 for funding to the tune of 1.5 crores towards infrastructure development. Dr. VEA appreciated the outcome of the previous FIST project awarded to ECE department and hoped that this project may also get funded.

To a discussion on improving the perception and image of SSNCE, Mr. NS suggested the use of digital technology and visual communications. He gave a few examples of a few institutions that are adopting this method. He also suggested that alumni teams can be reached out for this purpose.

Dr. SR informed that SSNCE has received the India Research Excellence Citation Awards 2023 on 28/09/2023 awarded by Clarivate, for the quality publications and citation under college category for the period 2017- 2022. Clarivate analytics acknowledges that SSNCE has published 3234 technical papers indexed in Web of Science (WoS) journals with more than 28000 citations out of which more than 40 papers are categorized as highly cited.

In further improving the quality of research, Dr. VEA mentioned that the research advisory committee that met on 27.08.2023, suggested bringing in retired faculty from CSIR labs, who were active in research in the past five years on full time appointment basis. Further, he mentioned that Dr.TV Geetha, Retired Professor, CEG, anna university has been recently appointed as Distinguished Visiting Faculty for the promotion of research.

In his concluding remarks the Chairman thanked all the members for their contribution and since there were no further items for discussion, the meeting came to an end at 11.45 am.

The IQAC Coordinator welcomed the members and gave a brief about the previous meeting. Thereafter following subjects have been discussed.

Item No. 1: Understanding the QS I-GAUGE rating

The IQAC coordinator gave a brief about QS I-GAUGE. It is a brand incorporated as an independent private-sector initiative for quality rating of colleges and universities in India in line with UK based QS (Quacquarelli Symonds). Apart from evaluating the core criteria, QS I-GAUGE also evaluates two of the advanced criteria. The institutions can choose between research and teaching type institutions. He explained the QS I-GAUGE rating process by taking an example of another institution. The result of the rating can be used as a scorecard to understand the strength and weakness and can be used a tool for institutional research and planning.

Item No. 2: Need for Green audit for next cycle of accreditation

The IQAC coordinator said that the NAAC requires to submit quality audits on environment and energy regularly. In this regard, he informed members about the green campus measures already in practice in our Institution such as restricted entry of automobiles, use of bicycles, the ban on use of plastic and landscaping with plants and trees etc. He also appraised to the members about the maintenance of various facilities such as sanitation and drainage, first aid kits, security and other safety measures. Further, he appraised about the water, waste and energy management practices of the Institution to meet the environmental sustainability.

Item No. 3: Forthcoming External Academic audit plan

Dr. Srinivas Gumparthi, ISO coordinator detailed about the preparations for academic audit and said it will be scheduled after two weeks of the announcement of the academic results during April 2022. He plans to conduct a two tier audit system covering more sample size.

Item No. 4: Preparing students for industry ready.

Shri.N. Sivasankaran, Industry Expert member-IQAC, addressed the expectations of the industry and ways to prepare students to be Industry ready. He pointed out students should develop the right set of abilities to meet the current and future needs of the industry. He said knowledge, Skills and attitude are the three most important qualifies for students to be successful in working with industries. Item No. 1: Integrating values into institutional culture

Dr.K.T. Selvan, professor gave a short presentation on values in knowledge institutions. He elaborated on the importance of the value system that drives institutions in pursuit of excellence. He also explained "respect as a value" and ways to infuse respect as a culture in an organization.

Item No. 2: Learning Outcomes - CO, PO and PSO attainment

Dr. Premanand Chandramani, Professor, ECE Department explained the procedure followed for CO, PO and PSO attainment in the Outcome-Based Education (OBE). He said Course Outcomes are framed based on the expected outcomes of a course on a higher knowledge level and attainment of COs are measured both direct and indirect ways. He suggested that increased weightage for internals and slightly lower weightage for end semester examinations for arriving the final grade. Further, he said contribution of indirect assessment may be increased in the overall attainment.

Item No. 3: Plan for the Forthcoming audit

Dr. Srinivas Gumparthi, ISO coordinator detailed about the preparations for academic audit and administrative audit. He explained the working of the IQAC cell in infusing the quality. In the audit plan, he recommended a two-tier audit system covering more sample size. He also outlined the preparations for the eighth cycle of ISO certification planned in the month of December 2022.

Item No. 4: Course file management and contents

Dr. Vijay, Associate Professor, BME Department presented a system for Course file management with an emphasis on course material arrangement which is important for NAAC, NBA, and ISO audits. He suggested for a comprehensive course plan (course description. Co-PO mapping, CO assessment method and concept mapping) that can be followed for subsequent batches by taking some remedial measures for any deficiencies. He also suggested that course file may contain concept mapping and methods for experiential learning as well.

Item No. 4: Community outreach activities - NSS Program Officers

The NSS program officers Dr.P. Kaythry and Dr. Jino Hans explained to the members the outreach and community activities conducted in the recent past and how those activities are beneficial to the members of the community. They also listed the number extension activities along with the routine activities and collaboration with the outside Organizations for the next few months.

Item No. 5: Plan of action for submission of AQAR 2021-2022 and SSR submission in May 2023

He pointed out the recent engagement with the three bodies namely the IQAC committee, Governing Body and Research Advisory Council are very useful. Both Governing Body and Research Advisory Council have appreciated the progress in Outcome based / Quantity based Metrics like Student outcomes [Higher studies and Placements] and Faculty Outcomes [Research, Publications, Patents, Projects]. Based on the discussions with the Governing Body and Research Advisory Council, the following generic points that are uniquely indicative of SSN have been identified.

- 1.Improving the Industry Orientation of Students and faculty
- 2.Improving the Quality of Learning
- 3. Measuring the Sustainability and Impact on Society
- 4. Quality Orientation in all actions -Shifting from quantity to quality

For each of these generic points the chair gave following suggestions and future actions.

- To identify some four or five generic points that are uniquely indicative of SSN, that can be tracked for qualitative improvements.
- To develop Socially Responsible support system for select schools [like Digital Library, NEET coaching etc]
- To conduct survey of Recruiting industries to understand "Industry Readiness"
- To study and select suitable Minor streams for Industry Readiness.
- To develop strategies for Learning without Teacher
- To develop training modules for mid class disruption
- To develop Value Added courses towards getting students ready for research Internships.
- To work with few industries to explore replicating their Incubator model at SSN
- To associate with few organizations and individuals for impact measurement of NSS/YRC activities.
- To consider revising PG Curriculum to facilitate one full year for projects.

He further said that six cross functional teams are created for tracking these points for qualitative and quantitative improvements.

Item No. 3: Any other points open for discussion as permitted by the Chair

Industry Expert member-IQAC, Shri.N. Siva Sankaran, appreciated the points presented by the chair as future initiatives are in the right direction. He further said that there is a need to engage students with variety of activities. In the process, he appreciated the timely completion of all the industry projects with SSNCE and said the industry related projects should not be delayed. He recollected the concept namely the "Say: Do ratio" an indicator of trust and accountability. - The IQAC coordinator welcomed the members and gave a brief introduction of the members of the committee. He thanked previous IQAC members for the timely submission of AQAR and Action taken report for last year (2019 -20) to NAAC. The details of the same is available in our college webpage. In his opening remark, he briefed about the importance and focus of Internal Quality Assurance Cell to ensure quality culture at all levels of the institution He also briefed about the importance of Annual Quality Assurance Report (AQAR) to be submitted to NAAC every year as per the format prescribed and available online.
- In his opening address, the chairman -IQAC, Dr.V.E. Annamalai, briefed about the curriculum revision (R2021), wherein number of new courses being introduced with an emphasis on academic flexibility. This exercise is expected to be completed by April 2021. The chairperson further briefed about the different facilities provided during the pandemic for teaching and learning using Online platforms such as Zoom, PANAPTO and Microsoft teams with the help of Dr.C. Aravindan. With reference to Examination and evaluation the chairman said Dr. Narasimhan, CoE team is exploring the possibility of conducting open book type of Examination.
- The chairman further explained steps taken to promote R&D activities. The institution encourages faculty to obtain external funded projects and inter disciplinary collaborative projects. With reference to innovation, he further said SSNCE is preparing for Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA) this year. However, he agreed that the institution has to improve upon activities related to consultancy and collaboration with industries.
- With reference to library access chairman said remote access is provided during pandemic through online library management system. With reference to physical infrastructure the chairman said it is always challenging as ever-expanding activities in the campus. He mentioned about the R&D projects worth 12.05 crores received from DST by Prof Ramasamy requiring additional infrastrure.
- The chairman pointed out that clean transparent performance appraisal scheme for incentives and promotions is in place. He also said our institution has the unique scheme wherein faculty members are encouraged to go for internship with industries.

- Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Expert member from industry and a consultant to number of industries agreed to extend his help for faculty interaction with industries. He invited details about the faculty strength in different domains.
- Mr. N. Sivasankaran, another member from industry informed the gap that exists between industry expectations vis -a vis level of the student at the time of passing out. He wanted students should be trained on leadership skills with sense of urgency (entrepreneurship). He also insisted that institution can showcase its strength through demo day.
- Mr. Mohinish Kumar, Data Analyst opined that through online platforms the content absorbed by students and tests are in general not effective. He suggested that students may be asked to compile notes on a weekly basis on the topics he/she learned.
- Mr. Santosh Naranapatty, Kaay Labs said that students on entering in to industry have to relearn/ new learn many subjects and also found lack of communication skills. The chairman responded the new regulation R2021 have incorporated more open electives and introduced activity-based learning i.e., learning by doing. Students also encouraged to take up NPTEL courses in exchange of electives in the final semester.
- With reference to communication skills both the industry experts Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian and Mr. Siva Shakaran have agreed that students may be trained more on Soft skills and group discussion and they should be free from any mind set blocks. The chairperson responded that in the revised curriculum R2021 new course on industrial practices with lab component is being introduced.
- Student representative Mr. Anand Satvik brought to the notice of flow of false and misinformation and wanted to reduce the information gap between students and college.
- Another student representative Ms. Sadhana Smrithi, wanted inculcate gender-sensitivity programs and workshops, considering the diversity of the members in the institution. Ms. Sadhana also wanted college to set up a redressal system/body for women.
- The chairperson thanked the members for their active participation in the meeting.

6.New Initiative - Activity for Institutional Development [AID]

Further, the chairman conveyed that for the development of the Institution, a set of major activities were identified, listed with a brief description of what is needed to be done and circulated to all faculty during the month of April 21, with a request to select two activities of their choice. After studying their choice, these activities were deployed to individuals. Few example activities were described by the coordinator and the members in general said that it will be helpful in understanding and functioning of each activity.

7. Promotion of Research and development

- Research Internship for other college students introduced at Rs.5,000 per month to cover boarding / lodging expenses, extendable for three months, during summer. The objective of this program is that other college students can experience SSN's research culture. In the month of June 2021, 120 virtual projects were offered to students of other Institutions. The chairman shared the information that 12 international conferences have been organized across the departments and for the period July 2020 to May 2021, a total of 461 International Journal publications are reported by SSNCE faculty.
- The chairman also reported that "The SSNCE database of Tamil dysarthric speech", developed at Speech lab, SSNCE, is now released by the Linguistic Data Consortium (LDC), University of Pennsylvania, officially, for rehabilitation research. LDC is a globally renowned distributor of linguistic data. The members appreciated the team for their efforts.

8.Industry interaction. The chairman wanted to share the following information about the MoUs signed with other Institutions.

Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Expert member from industry and a consultant said that details of few faculty who have agreed to interact with industries is received from Department of Mechanical Engineering and he will be assigning the industries to them soon.

9.Student feedback:

For a question on student feedback, the Coordinator said a formal student feedback on every subject is taken online, at the end of every semester and communicated to the concerned faculty and HoD. Corrective actions are planned between faculty and HoD, whenever the feedback score is less than 60%.

With reference to feedback, the student representative Ms. Sadhana Smrithi, observed that the feedback form is generally faculty centric and a section on placement and training etc., can be included. She further suggested that another overall feedback for the system as a whole that includes extracurriculars, workshops etc may be collected to understand the needs of the students.

10. Other points of discussion

- Mr. N. Sivasankaran, member from industry suggested that students could learn certain industry relevant tools so that the gap between industry expectations and the level of the graduated student may be reduced. He wanted students should be trained on new skills such as innovation and problem-solving skills through a new model that can also be assigned with Certain Credits.
- 180-degree consulting chapter to seek opportunities for non-tech or non-core interested students: Student representative Ms. Sadhana Smrithi said such chapter can be opened in SSN, similar to the one started recently in NIT Trichy and IIT M. It has a tie-up with city non-profits or small companies that can't afford business solutions or professional consulting services of their own. Here, students take on a project and help find solutions. Student representative Mr. Anand Satvik, also said many international B schools have this model.
- Both the members from Industry and the student representative members said there is a need for Career fair. Most of the students attending placements look for alumni's personal placement and higher studies experiences for their preparation. Ms. Sadhana Smrithi wanted that Alumni may be invited two months prior to the start of placement to speak about their career trajectory and other role in industry post SSN.
- The coordinator said Dr.C. Aravindan, HoD IT, has agreed to present a detailed discussion on the introduction of Experiential Learning during the next meeting. The coordinator also invited suggestions and presentations from all the members so that active contribution is ensured to IQAC.

The IQAC Coordinator briefed about the Academic and Administrative Audit held during the last week of August 2021.He presented the observations of the auditors through a consolidated report on the best practices followed and recommendations for quality improvement. Further, he presented the status of the current accreditation and the criteria wise CGPA score obtained. He further said the preparation for reassessment process can start from June 2022.Further, he put forward to the members for their suggestion and follow-up required towards improving the criteria wise scores through a power point presentation.

Item No.2: Integration of ISO and IQAC activities:

Prof Srinivas Gumparthi explained the initiative of integrating the audits of ISO with IQAC. The audits for ISO and IQAC were conducted as a single audit, by the joint efforts of ISO Coordinator Prof Srinivas Gumparthi with IQAC coordinator Prof Venkateswaran.

Item No.3: Recent NBA visit.

The Chairman - IQAC, Dr.V.E. Annamalai, briefed about the NBA accreditation team visit (online) during September 17 to 19, 2021. EEE, ECE, CSE, IT and BME programs were audited by NBA and the Experts interacted online, through zoom links. The chairman shared views and the feedback of the NBA team. He proposed certain action points such as common approach in CO-PO mapping, attainment calculation etc. The chairman further explained that the taskforce has been created and the need to improve documentation of the activities.

Item No.4: Report on NIRF 2021 SSNCE ranking

Dr.V.Rajini, Professor, Department of EEE, presented the NIRF21 results through a PPT presentation. SSNCE is ranked 45th position in Engineering category and 89 in overall category. She mentioned a slight improvement in the score against last year in Engineering category. However, she mentioned that competition among institutions is growing and more

and more Institutions including centrally funded Institutes also participate in the ranking framework.

Item No.5: Review on Placement Process:

Mr. Joythibasu, Manager – Placement, presented the statistics and improvements in placement over the last three years with reference to Number of companies visited, Number of offers received etc., in different categories. Mr. Joythibasu also mentioned that there is significant increase in the average annual salary for every year. He further elaborated on the improvement plans and the areas of focus in the next year due to the changes in the industry dynamics due to Covid -19 pandemic.

Item No.6: Any other matter with the permission of Chair:

- 1. With reference to improvements in internship opportunities for the industry experts Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, Industry expert expressed that that the internship period should be sufficiently long. The chairman -IQAC, Dr.V.E. Annamalai said that for UG courses in the 8th semester is fully available and for PG students entire 4th semester and partially 3rd semester is available. Mr. V. Kumara Subramanian, further assured that he will be able to find more internship opportunities from industry.
- 2. Mr. Siva Shakaran, another industry expert suggested that the need improve Research and development requirements to improve the NAAC rating. The chairman -IQAC, Dr.V.E. Minutes of the IQAC meeting

The IQAC meeting with President and Principal was held on 21-8-2019 between 2.00 PM to 3.30 PM, along with all the HODs. The internal and external audit outcomes were discussed and the following action points are agreed to be put in to practice across the departments of SSNI.

- 1. Students' feedback form for each course that would act as an 'exit survey' needs to be prepared with appropriate amendments to the existing Students feedback form. The IQAC team will prepare the amended form within 2 weeks, in consultation with all the Heads.
- 2. Remedial classes for common courses can be conducted during the 7th and 8th hours of the working days. This could also be done along with the remedial classes for other courses conducted beyond working hours and on working Saturdays.
- 3. A separate documenting system is suggested to capture innovative teaching practices with proofs collectively by each department.
- 4. Separate audit forms for Practical, Theory and Project courses is suggested. Separate form for Part-A and Part-B of the external audit is also agreed upon. IQAC team to pursue.
- 5. Automated tool for calculating CO-PO attainment will be prepared by Prof, T. Nagarajan, Head / IT and his team. To be implemented across departments after evaluation.
- 6. The end semester results are to be included in the individual course files for all courses. COE to provide support appropriately.
- 7. Access to 'LMS' content shall be given to all students of common courses and all the faculty members. Dr. Shashikant V. Albal and his team to implement.
- 8. The legends for knowledge level K1, K2 K6 shall be included in all the question papers. The marks allotted for subdivision questions are to be indicated in the question paper.
- 9. Separate attendance book is suggested for every course. Number of pages of the attendance book may be reduced accordingly.

The other topics that were discussed and agreed upon were:

- The gaps identified through the internal and external audit would be taken care of by the respective departments.
- 2. Auditors preferably to be of Professor cadre or to have extensive domain experience
- 3. Both Internal and External audits to have all the three components, namely Best practices, Gaps identified and Recommendations
- 4. Inclusion of K4/K5 component to be compensated through projects (J-component) is left to the discretion of the faculty concerned
- 5. External audits for affiliated courses also

A few more topics that were discussed in general were:

- Single script for all CATs for each student
- Plagiarism tool 'URKUND' discussed as tool for PG student reports and publications
- Single credit course for 15 periods spread over different days with no end semester examination
- Prospects of day-order timetable

Review of Action taken on items

Students' feedback form for each course that would act as an 'exit survey' needs to be
prepared with appropriate amendments to the existing Students feedback form. The
IQAC team will prepare the amended form within 2 weeks, in consultation with all the
Heads.

Feedback and inputs taken from different sources. Would be consolidated and floated again for more inputs. This process is iterative.

2. Remedial classes for common courses can be conducted during the 7th and 8th hours of the working days. This could also be done along with the remedial classes for other courses conducted beyond working hours and on working Saturdays.

3. A separate documenting system is suggested to capture innovative teaching practices with proofs collectively by each department.

4. Separate audit forms for Practical, Theory and Project courses is suggested. Separate form for Part-A and Part-B of the external audit is also agreed upon. – IQAC team to pursue.

5. Automated tool for calculating CO-PO attainment will be prepared by Prof. T. Nagarajan. Head / IT and his team. To be implemented across departments after evaluation.

6. The end semester results are to be included in the individual course files for all courses. COE to provide support appropriately.

End semester results are included in the individual course files of all departments

7. Access to 'LMS' content shall be given to all students of common courses and all the faculty members. Dr. Shashikant V. Albal and his team to implement.

Restricted access given on the discretion of the concerned faculty and this option is already available on LMS

8. The legends for knowledge level K1, K2 K6 shall be included in all the question papers. The marks allotted for subdivision questions are to be indicated in the question paper.

9. Separate attendance book is suggested for every course. Number of pages of the attendance book may be reduced accordingly.
